Welcome to Darg Wood

Darg Wood is located in the beautiful Northumberland countryside with views of the surrounding North Pennine fells and Slaley forest. We are a short distance from the beautiful towns of Hexham and Corbridge and the picturesque medieval village of Blanchland.



About Us

We (Mark and Beth Stobo) live at High Raw Green Cottage with our son and daughter (William and Isabel), our dog (Luther), horses (Ozzy and Harry), and an ever growing mix of pigs, ducks chickens and peafowl as well as all the wild animals and birds who make their home here.

What To bring

- Wellies or waterproof boots are essential for exploring the local area. We'd always suggest wellies and they are easier for slipping on and off as you move in and out of the hut.
- A torch for getting around the site in the dark
- Binoculars for watching the wildlife and taking in the views and the dark skies
- Road, gravel or mountain bike. There are some great routes for all abilities.

Darg Wood Hut is in Darg Wood, which is part of our property at High Raw Green Cottage, Steel, Hexham, NE47 0HL.

We are located 1 mile south of Whitley Chapel, accessible from the main road via a shared private driveway.

Parking

There is dedicated parking for guests of the hut on the gravel alongside a former pigsty adjacent to our house. Please reverse park alongside the pigsty as shown below.

A wheelbarrow is provided next to the parking space for your luggage – help yourself and make your way up to the hut. It's about 150 yards and can be muddy when wet so you might want to get into your wellies in the wetter months.

Check-In Information

We provide self-check-in via a key safe on site

Check-in is from 3 pm up until 9 pm on the day of your arrival.



There is a key box attached to the stable, next to our hen house on the way to the hut. Your key will be in the safe and we will send you the key code before arrival.

Checkout Time & Procedure

Checkout is by 10 am on the day of departure.

Please ensure the following:

- Any used bedding and towels should be placed in a bedding bag provided (bags are under the bed)
- Any dishes or cutlery used should be clean and left on the shelves as they were found.
- Any rubbish should be put in the bins next to the stable before leaving (please place recycling (**no glass**) in the green bin and general rubbish in the black bin).
- Please leave the hut as tidy as possible and let us know about any breakages.

The site

Our aim is to let Darg Wood be a small patch of wilderness and to make space for as much wildlife as possible. As well as majestic oaks and beautiful wildflowers, we love and value the weeds, broken trees, dead wood and rough scrub which are essential to the local wildlife. Management is very light touch and nothing natural is tidied up. This is a recent change from the previous use for grazing animals, and we are already surprised by just how much more wildlife we are seeing. Find a nice spot and sit quietly – especially at dawn and dusk – and let us know what you spot.



Our animals

You are welcome to wander anywhere within the woods and we don't mind if you visit our pigs in the nearby paddock. **Please don't feed any of our animals, including chickens and ducks.** It might seem mean, but the horses and pigs have particular dietary requirements and we do not want the birds to be encouraged to pester guests at the hut.

Eggs

Help yourself to fresh, free-range eggs. We will put them in the post-box near the firewood store.

Pigs

Tamworth pigs are an old breed, renowned for their hardiness, they have long legs and snouts, narrow backs, long bristles and a surprising ability to sprint for short distances as fast as a horse - very much like the wild boar.

Registered as a breed in the early 19th century on the statesman Sir Robert Peel's estate at Tamworth in Staffordshire, they have lost out to fast-growing, large-littering modern breeds specifically designed for intensive farming. The Rare Breeds Survival Trust estimates fewer than 300 registered breeding Tamworth females in the UK.

We take on pigs as weaners at around 8 weeks old and raise them in paddocks and temporary enclosures around our land. Our pigs are given plenty of space and exercise and we move them around the site to give them the chance to forage naturally for acorns under our oak trees and through rough vegetation. They are keen rootlers and can turn over

ground at an astounding rate. This is good for the wildlife, encouraging pioneer species to take hold and providing opportunities for so-called 'weed' species - food sources for many birds.



Pork

We usually have a well-stocked freezer of home raised, rare-breed pork which you are welcome to purchase. All meat is professionally butchered and packaged off site and is sold from frozen. See the appended price list and let us know before you arrive if you would like to have some delicious pork waiting in the fridge for you.

Boundaries

Please leave all gates as you find them and beware of electric fences (white tape or string).

Please don't visit neighbouring livestock at the fences – particularly cows. They are curious and will approach as a group and may damage the old fence which could result in a lot of damage to our site.

Our neighbours

We expect guests to respect our neighbours and their land and livestock. Please do not go onto neighbouring land without permission, except for public footpaths or public access areas. We also ask guests to be mindful of noise and observe quiet hours after 10pm.

Appliances/Features

Wi-fi

Wi-Fi is provided by a mobile broadband router. You will find it on the shelves next to the foot of the bed. To switch on press and hold the central button.

Please do not remove from the hut and charge only with the cable provided

Firewood

You are welcome to bring your own wood and kindling but we will stock the hut and pigsty for your arrival and you can help yourself to more from our log store. We buy wood in from a local supplier. We don't charge for extra but if you use a lot, a small voluntary contribution would be appreciated.

Please don't collect fallen wood from the site, it is an important part of the woodland ecosystem and provides habitat and food. It is also generally wet and rotten and burns terribly anyway. Please clean up the fireplace and firepit/grill after use using the ash buckets provided.

Charcoal

We don't provide charcoal so please bring what you need if you prefer to cook with charcoal on the barbecue.

Central Heating

Central heating is used to maintain the temperature of the hut over winter. In warm weather it will be switched off – **please do not adjust the heating or radiator settings.**

Oven

The oven requires a timer to be set (left-hand knob) to run. This is a safety feature to prevent the oven from being left on accidentally. Turn the knob to the length of time you require and operate as normal.

Worktops

Please take great care with the oak worktops. They will mark if left wet or with wet dishes on the surface. Dry spills immediately and use the heat mat provided for hot pans and dishes.

Sink

The sink has no overflow. Do not leave running unattended.

Kettle

Tip: Works best on the smaller hob as the larger sends heat around the outside.

Extractor fan

The switch for the bathroom extractor fan is raised next to the main door. It is useful to run the fan and open the door while cooking where possible.

Storage

A large storage space is provided beneath head end of the bed. The cupboard at the foot of the bed is reserved for our use. You are also welcome to store items beneath the deck or the hut during your stay. For bike storage you are welcome to keep the bike under the hut or in the pigsty or in one of our stable buildings.

Rubbish Bins

Small bins are provided under the sink – rubbish can be transferred to the bins located near the keysafe, behind the stable building.

Glass

A tub is provided to hold glass bottles and can be temporarily stored outside for convenience. Glass bottles are not recycled by the local collections and should be taken to a recycling facility – there is one in Wentworth car park - Hexham. Please return the tub after use

LOCAL INFORMATION

Eating out

There are lots of places to eat in the surrounding area - a few of our favourites are listed below but we strongly suggest you have a look at local tourism websites or Tripadvisor for a fuller picture of the local area – there's too much to list here

Nearest

- The Traveller's Rest Pub – now run primarily as a café though pub meals are often offered at weekends – the situation changes often so please call to confirm your plans to avoid disappointment

Pubs

We don't get out as much as we used to but here are our favourite local pubs – in no particular order. Some of the more rural pubs have changeable opening times so its best to call ahead.

The Heart of Northumberland – Hexham – Excellent selection of beers

The Tannery – Hexham - Similar to the Heart

The Travellers Rest – now run as a café, call ahead to check whether food is being served

The Dipton Mill Inn – Dipton Mill - Cosy country pub with own brewery

The Lord Crewe Arms – Blanchland - drinking in a historic setting – a great place to visit

The Angel – Corbridge – Good place for people-watching in the sun

The Peel Tower – Corbridge – Great historic building in the centre of Corbridge

Local Activities and Amenities

From the door

Walking

The local walks and rides are fantastic with enough freedom that even after years here we still find new routes and places to explore. Maps are provided in the hut and we can suggest local rides and walks to suit your needs but the best thing is to take a map and make it up as you go along.

Cycling

The roads in the region are generally quiet and generally hilly, with fantastic views on offer in return for your efforts. Head south towards Stanhope, Rookhope and Allenheads if you like hills, or head along the Tyne valley on the gentle backroads through villages and farms.

There are some excellent mountain biking routes in the local area. Depending on fitness and skill level you can ride for 5 or 50 miles without spending much time at all on tarmac. Many of the local bridleways and forest roads are suitable for gravel bikes, for more experience mountain bikers there are hidden sections of singletrack and some fun descents if you know where to look – I'd be happy to point you in the right direction. Also, Chopwell woods (30 mins away by car), Hamsterley Forest (45 minutes) and Kielder (1 hour) all offer fantastic man made mountain biking trails.

Further afield

The Coast

The stunning Northumberland coast is a short trip away and makes a fantastic day out. A favourite of ours is the walk from Craster to Dunstanburgh Castle. Or crab stottie with a pint from the micro-brewery at The Ship Inn, Low-Newton-by-the-sea. Bamburgh, Druridge and Howick are all worth the drive if you have some time to spare.

Banks

The closest bank with a cash machine is on the high street in Hexham. There is an HSBC, Halifax, Barclays and others. Please note there are no banks in Corbridge, only a cash machine in the Co-op grocery store.

Petrol Stations

There is a Shell station in Hexham as well as a BP near the A69 roundabout. There is also a Shell station in Corbridge.

Groceries

There is a small community-run shop in Slaley village.

In Hexham, there is a Waitrose, Aldi and Tesco Extra and M&S. In Corbridge there is a co-op. Both Hexham and Corbridge have a range of independent shops – in Corbridge, Stobo's fruit and Veg shop is highly recommended.

Hospital

For minor injuries, you can visit the local hospital in Hexham. The centre treats conditions including minor head, ear or eye problems, broken nose or nose bleed, sprains, strains, cuts and bites, children's minor injuries and ailments, minor fractures or broken bones, minor skin abscesses and infections and wound infections. It is open between 8am and 10pm.

Home-Raised Rare-Breed Pork

Price List



The pork we produce is from rare breed Tamworth pigs raised here at our home. Our pigs are moved around our site and given plenty of space and exercise, with the opportunity to dig and forage.

Tamworths are an old breed, still closely related to their wild boar ancestors and are used extensively in rewilding projects to regenerate overgrown areas. They love to dig and turn over large areas of ground in no time, foraging for roots, worms, and acorns.
